The Chair welcomed the Members and made the following remarks:

- On September 27, 2021 Samantha and I attended a virtual Conservation Ontario Council meeting, where the Phase 1 CA Act changes continues to be a key agenda item and discussion topic, as well as other matters pertinent to Ontario CAs.
- On October 4, 2021 the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) released the Phase 1 regulations to implement amendments to the *Conservation Authorities Act* made in 2019/2020. Samantha has a report later on this agenda for

questions and discussion, and a meeting of the CA Act Ad-hoc Committee has been scheduled for October 27, 2021 to further discuss the regulatory changes and associated timelines for coming into conformance with the legislation. Following the meeting, the Ad-hoc Committee was rescheduled to meet on October 29, 2021.

• GRCA staff are beginning to receive requests from member municipalities to present the 2022 budget. GRCA budget presentations will be provided to our participating municipal councils upon request.

- 12. Reports:
 - 12.1 GM-10-21-75 Conservation Authorities Act Amendments Phase 1 Regulations and Timelines

- S.Lawson provided a presentation to highlight details of the three provincial regulations that were released as a result of the Phase 1 amendments under the Conservation Authorities Act. The regulations include Mandatory Programs and Services; Transition Plan and Agreements; and Rules of Conduct in Conservation Areas
- Under the mandatory programs and services regulation, three categories have been defined to classify all conservation authority programs. The categories are: levy funded and regulated programs, municipal requested programs offered through local agreements and/or other outside funding sources, and other programs and services funded through special agreements, government grants, and/or self-generated revenue
- Under the mandatory programs and services regulation, key deliverables and timelines have been established by the Province. These deliverables include strategies and plans for specific components of the mandatory programs and services. These strategies and plans must be completed by December 31, 2024
- Under the rules and conduct in conservation areas regulation, individual regulations for each Ontario conservation authority pertaining to their conservation areas have been consolidated into one cohesive regulation. There is little to no impact on GRCA operations coming out of this regulation
- S.Lawson went on to further highlight the key deliverables for the transition plan, details of work requirements, including creating a programs and services inventory and identifying categories for all programs and service currently being provided. The transition to the new regulation will require a collaborative effort with watershed municipalities in order to create agreements for services, and will require time commitments to meet the requirements for creating the land management and infrastructure strategies and plans identified in the regulations
- Phase 2 regulations will focus on levy requirements and conservation authority fees, and will be helpful in creating the programs and services inventory. An anticipated release date for these additional updates has not yet been established by the Province
- Board members asked questions related to incorporating climate considerations into the planning process, tree planting programs, and identifying programs that are important to watershed citizens that can still be offered through council approved municipal agreements
- S.Lawson discussed aspects of the regulations and the transition plan that will identify opportunities to highlight the GRCA's programs, and noted that the classification process into the three categories will be challenging as many programs may have components that span different categories provided by the Province
- The next steps will include developing a draft transition plan and inventory of programs and services, initiating discussions with participating municipalities,

following provincial timelines for key deliverables, and updating the budget format to be implemented for 2024.

12.7 GM-10-21-74 - September 22-23, 2021 Flood Event

- D.Boyd provided an overview of the recent flood event, noting that the last flood event of this magnitude occurred in September 1986.
- This watershed-wide flood event saw precipitation up to 120mm in some areas, with the most heavily affected areas being the head waters of the Nith River, as well as central and north-western parts of the watershed.
- The high water level came near to the top of the Wellesley dam, and an inspection of the dam has since been completed.
- A post-event debriefing is scheduled with affected municipalities and flood coordinators, as every flood event provides learning opportunities for improving procedures in emergency flood response.
- Board members commented on the event, noting the high water levels and discussed opportunities to share the details of these flood events, and how Conservation Authorities manage water-control infrastructure to reduce flood damage.
- J.Nowak shared his concern about the event at Wellesley Dam, and inquired about contact information for emergencies. D.Boyd shared that a flood coordinators guide highlights key contacts, and is prepared annually and distributed to all municipal flood coordinators and emergency response teams across the watershed. Board members will receive the most recent copy by mail following the meeting, to ensure it has been received.
- S.Foxton added that it may be beneficial for the Board to receive an update on the watershed flood warning communication system and the process

followed by staff, municipal flood coordinators, and emergency response units in such events.

 D.Boyd highlighted that it is important to maintain consistent use of reliable communications systems during floods, and that the current flood notification system works efficiently. During a flood event, the GRCA notifies municipal coordinators, who initiate a fanout notification process. The GRCA webpage and a dedicated social media account is also updated regularly to help share accurate information.
